Maximum Items Checked Out

Patrons in good standing (owing less than \$10) may have a maximum of 100 items (including 20 movies, 40 CDs, 5 video games) checked out at a time. New patrons may have a maximum of 10 items at a time for the first 30 days.

Patrons 60 and Older

Patrons 60 & older are exempt from overdue fines, except on DVDs, Blurays, video games, preloaded e-readers, guitars, and slide & negative scanners. They receive a 3-day grace period on DVDs, Blu-rays, and video games.

Lost, Stolen, or Missing Cards & Items

Patrons are responsible for all materials checked out on their card including lost and damaged items. Please report immediately. Replacement card is \$2.

Past Due Accounts

Past due accounts owing \$25 or more may be sent to a collection agency.

Cards for Children 17 & Under

Parents are responsible for their children's library cards. Only legal guardians/custodians are allowed access to a child's card. A parent or guardian may ask (in-person only) to have grandparents, siblings, child care providers, step-parents, etc. added to a child's account.

Adding Users to Your Account

A patron's library record is confidential. A patron may ask at the Circulation desk (inperson only) to have a specified user(s) added to their account.

Digital Library

Access your account at ghpl.org to place reserves, renew materials, pay fines, save searches, and create lists. Also, reserve a meeting room, download or stream digital media, learn about library events/news, donate to the library, and access information and resources.

Most items are automatically renewed when due, up to a maximum number of renewals, unless requested by other patrons.



While we're certainly not questioning the validity of *My Fair Lady*, an even stronger case could be made for Stanley Kubrick's absurdist black comedy about the Cold War.




Mr. Deeds Goes to Town (1936) March 12
